Diet; herbivore

Description: The longest dinosaur skeletons ever found belong to the *Diplodocus*. Its snout was unique, with nostrils on the top and teeth like piano keys at the front only. *Diplodocus* had a very small brain for its size. It ate high leaves by standing up on its back legs.



Stegosaurus (STEG-uh-SAWR-us)



Name Meaning: roof lizard

Temporal Range: 155-150 million years ago

Diet: herbivore

Height: 4.5 metres

Length: 8.5 metres

Weight: 3000 kilograms

Description: Stegosaurus had large triangular plates along its back, which flushed with blood and may have warned predators or regulated its temperature. Its tail sported four massive spikes, which were used to defend it against attacks.



CRAFT ACTIVITY


Arrr... me hearties! It's time to make a pirate hat to wear at sea.

Materials


A rectangular sheet of newspaper Sticky tape

Instructions

- 1. Place a rectangular sheet of newspaper on a flat surface in a portrait layout.
- 2. Fold the Sheet of newSpaper from top to bottom and create a crease.
- 3. Fold the folded Sheet of newspaper from left to right, create a crease and unfold.
- 4. Fold the top left corner towards the middle crease to create a triangle.
- 5. Repeat the previous step with the right hand side.
- 6. Add a small piece of tape to hold the triangles together.
- Take the top layer of paper from the bottom section of your hat and fold it upwards so that it covers the bottom section of the triangles.
- 8. Turn the paper over and repeat the previous step.
